I think I shared the same sense of excitement with more than 300 attendees for the return of the USDF FEI Level Trainers Conference on 16 - 17 January 2023 after a couple years of hiatus because of Covid.

The speakers chosen for this year's Conference were all members of the FEI Judges Supervisory Panel (JSP): Linda Zang, Lilo Fore, Henk van Bergen and David Hunt. It is important to know what the function of the JSP is to understand why they are here. Without a doubt, we were treated to two wonderful educational days filled with detailed information, each one with its own style.

On Monday night Dressage4Kids hosted a round table with the panelists. Lendon Gray introduced her many programs to develop youth in this country. It was a fun and relaxed event where they were asked a few personal and theory questions like when they started teaching, how you introduce a double bridle to the rider, what trainers don't pay attention to with the riders, and which exercise people aren't doing enough. D4K Training4Teaching Panel Discussion Summary

A Training4Teaching Evening

with the Experts of the USDF FEI Dressage Trainers' Conference: Lilo Fore, David Hunt, Henk van Bergen and Linda Zang

When Lendon Gray, founder of Dressage4Kids (D4K) sees an opportunity for education, she makes it happen. And when Tuny Page of Stillpoint Farm sees an opportunity to support a great cause, she makes it much easier to happen. So on Monday night, January 16th, it happened—a panel discussion with four of the best instructors in the world who had convened near West Palm Beach, Florida for the annual USDF Trainers Conference. The panel was moderated by another of the best instructors in the world—Lendon Gray. Lendon conceived of Training4Teachers as an offshoot of D4K, because after all, kids graduate from D4K and many of them become teachers. Most of them know about riding and the theory behind it, but there's not much training available in "how to teach." So, once again, Lendon made it happen. Here's a sampling of the gems that were shared that evening.

Lendon: Can you explain how you introduce the double bridle to a rider for the first time.

Linda Zang: I attach both the snaffle and curb reins to the snaffle bit in the beginning until the rider is comfortable managing two reins.

Lilo Fore: I want to stress that the snaffle bridle is what trains the horse the most, and it's important that the rider be able to ride well in the snaffle before being introduced to the curb. The double bridle is to be respected, and it is an honor to ride with one.

Lendon: How do you manage a walk that is not naturally a 4-beat walk. That is, when there is a rhythm problem not caused by poor riding.

Lilo Fore: You have to ride and train in the walk. Too many people just educate their horses in trot and canter. Poles are also useful in training the rhythm of walk.

David Hunt: It's all about throughness. If your horse is through and in front of the leg, then your horse is probably going to have a good walk.

Henk van Bergen: In the walk, the horse tells you the truth!

Linda Zang: Riders need to be careful not to collect the walk too soon. That's a common cause of a poor walk.

Lendon: Can you each give us one example of something you think riders don't pay enough attention to.

Lilo Fore: Independent aids and body awareness.

Linda Zang: Rider balance and the horse staying up in the outer shoulder. Also, poorlyfitting saddles often cause position problems in the rider.

Henk van Bergen: Riders specialize too soon.

David Hunt: Forward, straight and through. When those conditions are met, the rider automatically sits well.

Lendon: When should a rider start to ask for more expression?

David Hunt: The horse must be comfortable and balanced in a natural trot and canter. When he's relaxed then you can start asking for more. Acceptance of the bit creates that relaxation. Relaxation doesn't create acceptance. The horse has to give himself to you.

Lendon: Can you give us advice on when and how to teach reinback?

Lilo Fore: Babies learn how to reinback long before they're ridden. Then under saddle they already know it. By nature, they don't want to step back. Practically speaking, they'd rather simply turn around. But when they learn it as babies, there's never tension associated with it.

Linda Zang: At the top levels, there aren't many good ones. Even in the judging at the World Championships in Herning, Denmark, the reinbacks were weak.

Lendon: What exercise would each of you say is not practiced enough.

Linda Zang: Turn on the forehand

Lilo Fore: Halt

Henk van Bergen: Proper transitions

David Hunt: Accuracy
